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Message from the Principal

s an educator, a consistent question I ask myself on a regular basis is "What is the legacy we want our young people to take with them when they leave our school?"

Our holistic philosophy of 'Life in all its Fullness' encompasses many of the values and opportunities we want to offer our students, but it is important that we go deeper, that we provide space and safety, to reflect on how we can really make a difference. One thing that fits into this idea is **student leadership and voice**, which helps our young women and men to take ownership of social issues and to repair the disconnect between what we *know* and what we *do*.

Throughout our first five academic years we have always taken the position that it is important for our young people to be empowered and not feel they cannot affect outcomes. We want them to not be passive bystanders when confronted with social injustice but to be active agents of change. This can happen in many ways and comes in many forms such as the *United Nations' Sustainable Goals, the Eco*-*schools* project, fundraising and other charitable initiatives. There are certainly some excellent practices happening at HIS.

Importantly, and each year, we return to the idea of 'restorative justice', an approach which asks victims and offenders to mediate a resolution that all of us can be satisfied with, so that students learn the skills necessary to deal with (to quote Shakespeare) "the slings and arrows of outrageous fortune" which life throws our way. In this constantly evolving environment, now, more than ever, we need to build strengths such as resilience, knowledge of how to stay safe and how to treat others with kindness and respect. Our Weeks of Kindness and Gratitude give us some time to reflect, consider our actions and do some good deeds.

In many ways this is a lovely, safe school environment in which to learn and play. But not everyone feels like this all the time. Vulnerability, fragility and making the wrong choices or decisions can also happen in any school context. Bullying culture has changed in nature, along with the rise in social media – perhaps less physical and more emotional these days, but nonetheless hurtful and damaging. Recent figures from the *Malaysian Education Ministry's Students' Discipline Misconduct System*, shows an increase of nearly 20% in cases of bullying since 2014. This, of course, refers to statistics from the state school system but international schools are not immune to such trends. In many ways, it is harder to say something unkind to someone's face – much easier to send an email without realising the hurt which can be caused by such actions.

A recent opportunity to host a round-table discussion on bullying, along with UNICEF, has given our school counsellors and myself some better insight into safer school practices. HIS is leading good practice and many of our staff receive training on regular issues such as First Aid. They have also received training in how to look out for self-harm and on suicide prevention. We often talk about the things we do well in a celebratory way, things that highlight the school's achievements and our students' wonderful talent and dedication. However, we don't always find it easy to talk about the pastoral challenges at HIS and how our teachers, counsellors and leadership constantly work to ensure the safety and awareness of our students. These challenges do need to be discussed frankly and positively, otherwise we are in danger of allowing ourselves and our students of carrying poor decisions into the future. We want to make sure our young people are aware of the consequences of their words and actions and that they do not leave HIS and continue to take these attitudes into their lives beyond the school walls, repeating mistakes made.

After this serious note above, perhaps it is time now that I move on to more happy, seasonal thoughts. I do wish to thank everyone who has worked so hard at HIS this year and I hope that we all can have a joyous holiday break. If you are travelling, please go safely. Have a great time with family and friends and I look forward to seeing you in the new year.

Secondary Vpdate

This half term saw a myriad of activities organised and led by Secondary and A-Level students, and we are certainly very proud of their initiatives and efforts.

Our prefects supported several school open days and fairs by being wonderful HIS ambassadors to visitors. HIS digital student leaders highlighted the relevance and application of technology to their fellow students during Computer Science Education Week. Secondary student leaders also played the role of big brother/ big sister to their younger peers at the swim galas.

More than 150 HIS students attended the *Make A Difference Leadership Summit* (*M.A.D.*) and three teams were awarded funding to carry out projects to promote gender equality and environmental consciousness. At the same time, three students represented HIS in the recent International Eco-School Conference and contributed to the national action plan. In the last two months, a team of Year 10 students raised funds and took part in the 24 Hour Race, a global movement to raise awareness about anti-trafficking; 42 Year 8 to 11 students debated about global issues at the World Scholar's Cup Tournament of Champions at Yale; and 12 football players competed in the Asia's largest international schools football tournament held in Phuket.

The list is by no means exhaustive, so many more events had taken place and there are more exciting opportunities coming up in Term 2, one of which is the annual school production.

We wish our students preparing for their mock IGCSE and A-Level exams all the very best.

IT TAKES A VILLAGE TO RAISE A CHILD

Celebrating 5 Years of Parent Volunteering

What prompted you to volunteer in the first place?

Shanice: I'm quite a new volunteer having started only in the last academic year after being approached by Lyana, another parent volunteer. My main task is to catalogue and shelve all Mandarin books, but I do help out in other special projects that the school undertakes.

Carissa: I started with the first batch of parent volunteers in 2014, some of whom have left since their children have graduated from HIS. Most of our volunteers started off at the library – we needed a system in place for children to borrow the books, we had many books to catalogue; textbooks to be distributed; books to be wrapped etc. We even worked together with the school and canteen operator to improve the quality of food in the canteen. I felt that there was a lot I could do to help the school grow and become successful. **Eunice:** I started at the library only in 2017. Even though it has only been about a year, I feel very much at home here in the library. At the same time, I get to make friends and exchange parenting tips with other parents as well!

Datin Swee Lin: I started the Eco Garden at HIS in April 2015. I enjoy gardening because I believe in the healing powers of gardening to nurture our physical and mental well-being.

What motivated you to stay on and to continue volunteering?

Shanice: I enjoy all that I have done so far and I enjoy the company of those I work with. The caring people whom I work with makes a lot of difference to how you feel about coming to "work". I actually look forward to coming to school and spend time working with my friends. I remember when I was sick and couldn't turn up for my duties at the library, Ms Elizabeth actually called me up to enquire about how I was feeling. After that, I started receiving a lot of texts from other parent volunteers asking about how I was feeling. The camaraderie is amazing and it makes me feel at home.

Carissa: HIS welcomes parental involvement and the management is very transparent in its communication with the parents. As such, I felt like working as family and I stayed on to help. Helping out at the library has kept me growing and learning every day. I feel like home in HIS and hence, I like it that I am doing all these in the comfort of home.



The efforts of parent volunteers are a vital part of the HIS community. Currently, there are over 100 parents who offer their time and talent generously to support various school activities and events, ranging from library duty and storytelling, charity projects, sports days, gardening and school productions, career week show and tell etc. As we celebrate the 5th anniversary in the school's history, we speak to a few parent volunteers whose volunteering experience at HIS varies from one to five years, to catch a glimpse of the joy they find in volunteering at HIS.

Whai Whai: I started volunteering at the library doing circulation duties and am now in charge of library displays. The library has definitely come a long way since 2014. Today, all the systems circulation and cataloguing are all in place. The colourful three-dimensional displays you see all over the library are contributed by students. We will soon be implementing a new system of shelving books, aimed at cutting down time and increasing efficiency. There is never a dull moment in the library and that keeps me going!

Lyana: I like the company. But most importantly, I know what I have been doing is also creating a positive impact on my kid. Because of what I do, it has somewhat raised a sense of social awareness in my son, motivating him to volunteer help whenever needed.

Eunice: I like the fact that HIS welcomes parental involvement. Not many schools really welcome that. Being in a school that is open to parental involvement is important because we as parents, would want to be part of the school community, involved in developing our children and seeing them grow. I will continue to volunteer because I enjoy seeing happy children in the library, and knowing that I am part of making this change possible.

Datin Swee Lin: As part of the green education, when we first started, we did a lot of show-and-tell and talks for preschool and KS1 students on the different types of seeds and their mode of dispersal. Each Year 5 and 6 class was given their own planter box and they had to decide what to plant. We also arranged 2 classes on Bokashi composting for parents. I really hope to bring about more awareness amongst our school community on the benefits of gardening and the importance of ecological/ environmental awareness.

Pat: The gardening project was not without some teething problems, a lot of construction rubble and cement in the soil, and poor drainage. But that did not deter us. We slowly but steadily worked the land and

today, I am proud to say that we have been able to harvest and share the plants and vegetables with the school community.

Sue: I have helped in the charity bazaars, been involved with the refugee school program the school is involved in, and also helped start an income sustainable project amongst the refugee mums, partnering with United Nations. It motivates me to see how we're making a difference in the lives of the refugees, and how we can use these projects to teach our kids to have compassionate hearts for the less fortunate.

What do you enjoy most about the volunteering experience?

Lyana: I am involved the ZEC refugee center project, where I dealt with the mothers at ZEC on a sewing project with UNHCR. The initiative saw mothers at ZEC being taught how to sew, working on little projects to sell, thereby enabling them to earn a living for their families. I was involved in the logistical arrangements getting a trainer to teach, setting up training venues, collecting donated sewing machines, working with UNHCR for reimbursement of materials, etc. It is very rewarding to see that they have learnt a skill and are now able to be self-supporting, rather than merely waiting for donations to help them. I feel accomplished that the project goals were met.

Carissa: Other than volunteering at the library, I also volunteer for special projects involving the ZEC refugee centre. There, I taught the kids Science every alternate Tuesday. I try to do hands-on activities like arts and crafts related to Science. I found the kids there to be very bright but unfortunately, lacking in the opportunity for formal education. I feel very motivated when I see their joy in seeking to improve themselves.

Datin Swee Lin: I am proud to announce that we have a great variety of edible plants and vegetables in our garden. For example, we have Ginseng Jawa, ginger, turmeric, yam, spinach, purslane, sweet potato and butterfly pea, just to name a few. These plants are growing very well, thanks to the bokashi compost cultivated with the canteen kitchen waste.

Pat: I like the fact that students are interested to learn and put in the effort. It was very heartwarming to see that students took so much pride and care with the plants, watering the plants dutifully every break time.

We hope that one day, the school will be able to achieve zero-waste. Right now, we are doing Bokashi composting with the canteen kitchen waste. We have conducted Bokashi composting workshops for parents. I really want to do my part in empowering others in the school community with the knowledge to grow, to take care of plants and to do more for the environment.

Joanne: I have helped mainly with editing and proofreading for the school bulletins and newsletters (3 years); the school library (3.5years); teaching at the ZEC school for refugee children (1 year); and making and designing costumes for school plays and musicals (1 year). In the library, I enjoy sharing good books with the children and helping them find the books they want. At ZEC, I was amazed how the children were so eager to learn and so grateful for the time we spent with them. For the school productions, I love seeing the students bring the characters to life with the help of the costumes I made.

Are there any memorable experience you would like to share with us?

Shanice: There are many memorable events, from Book Week to special Christmas charity projects. It makes me happy to see the students' joy when they participate earnestly in the events, knowing that I am part of the team that made things happen.

Eunice: Helping out in the school library gives me the opportunity to see how the children have grown over time. I have seen children become more confident over the course of the year and I think it is the nurturing environment that has enabled this transformation to happen.
