In Art, Year 9 students studied the art movement Surrealism and were asked to make Surreal sculptures.

For inspiration they were shown Magritte's sculpture called "The Future of Statues", which features the death mask of Napoleon Bonaparte. The students took casts of their own faces using "Modroc" and these were going to be made into individual sculptures with unique surface designs. During the process of making art, things can change. This project changed into one large "site-specific" sculptural installation, using the most successful casts and the number that would fit around the pillar. All the students of Year 9 worked on the sculpture collaboratively, showing great team spirit and ingenuity. Apart from the masks, the whole structure of the sculpture is made from recycled material - packaging for computers and projectors.

PRESCHOOL & PRIMARY

Preschool IEYC 'Toy Shop'

Students had the opportunity to visit a toy shop set up by the teachers and experienced shopping. They decided on their purchases based on how much money they were given. They had the opportunity to role-play, taking turns to be the shop manager, cashier and security guard. Students also had a chance to turn toymaker, creating a toy of their choice.









Year 1 IPC 'The Stories People Tell'

The students showcased their cooperative skills when working together to make up their own imaginative stories using props and a story plot. They planned, rehearsed and finally performed their stories to the whole class. The students worked hard to deliver their fantastic stories and we were all kept well entertained with plenty of laughter to be had!





Year 2 IPC 'Push Me, Pull You'

The students were asked to plan and build a moving toy, to implement what they have learnt about one of the following; Buoyancy, Gravity, Friction or Air resistance. They all did a fantastic job at working independently to research and plan their projects in great detail. They worked effectively as part of their team, and proudly presented their very-own-made toys.







As part of our last IPC unit on 'Inventions that Changed the World', we learnt about hydropower. It's a growing source of electricity in Africa, which is the continent of our adopted countries. The Year 3s investigated hydropower by designing a route for water to flow from the top to the bottom of the school garden fence. Our aim was to turn a water wheel and understand that gravity drives hydropower.








Our year 10 GCSE PE students took part in a rock climbing session today. Students were given the opportunity to do rock climbing, bouldering, learn rope skills and belaying!

DESIGN & TECHNOLOGY: F1

Year 9 are now F1 racers. In conjunction with the 'F1 in Schools International Competition' based in the UK, students follow technical guidelines and specifications to create a model racing F1 car. Students must 3D design the car from scratch, using flow simulation programs to run aerodynamic tests. The car is then CNC machined and prepared for real racing. Students must also work in a racing team to create a brand identity and merchandise. All this is accomplished the monetary sponsorship from real companies in the local city. Once all items are ready, students aim to compete at an international level for the fastest record and a trip to the real F1 racing event.


