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# PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE



## MR MARTIN VAN RIJSWIJK

I trust that everyone had a relaxing and enjoyable break over the Chinese New Year period. I was struck by just how quiet KL can get during this time of the year when many families either 'balik kampung', or simply go on holiday somewhere. No traffic jams for a whole week!

February has proven to be a particularly hectic month, with many events taking place. We returned from the Chinese New Year break to concerns over Coronavirus potentially spreading across Asia. Having experienced similar outbreaks during the Bird Flu, Swine Flu, SARS and MERS pandemics, I found myself in familiar territory, as the need for swift safety precautions was immediately obvious. Organisations such as the Federation of British International Schools in Asia (FOBISIA) have proven to be tremendous source of up-to-date information. FOBISIA has allowed us to not only get advice from Malaysian authorities, but also be kept fully informed about what other countries and international schools in Asia are doing to combat the spread of Coronavirus.

I would like to take this opportunity to acknowledge the sensible and calm manner in which our community has reacted to the news of the Coronavirus outbreak. I would also like to particularly commend the integrity of those families who had family members that had travelled to China recently, and who very openly shared this information with us and willingly imposed a self-quarantine. This has proved to be tremendously reassuring for our community.

While we have had to be more cautious than usual, the outbreak has not prevented us from proceeding with key events that we had planned. We had an incredibly entertaining and energetic

Chinese New Year assembly. Congratulations to our Mandarin Department and our performers who did themselves proud. I couldn't think of nicer, more entertaining way to return back to school.

Recently we hosted an enormously successful *Making a Difference (M.A.D.) Youth Summit* for a number of schools in Malaysia, and also hosted a *Tech for Good* parent talk. Both events were very well attended. Congratulations to four of our teams who were successful in pitching their entrepreneurship and community service proposals at the *M.A.D. Youth Summit*. Team Consenses were awarded RM5,000 to help them action their proposal, while three other HIS teams were also awarded seed money to initiate their projects (see page 9-10 for more details). Congratulations also to Team RedTalks for exhibiting their project and placing 3rd. This reflects well on our school's efforts to develop future leaders.

Last week, we had a Membership Evaluation Team from the Council of International Schools (CIS) visit our school for two days as the initial step in our application for full accreditation with them. CIS is the premier accreditation organisation in the world of international school education. The process is an extremely demanding and thorough one, and will take up to two years to complete. Their rigorous standards include a wide range of criteria, from quality of educational programme to effective health and safety protocols, as well as well-developed governance and administrative policies and procedures.

While there are a lot of schools that have associate member status with CIS, only a small number strive to meet full accredited status with them. Now that we are in our sixth year of operation, it is the right time to set ourselves the goal of achieving full accreditation. The feedback gained from this initial visit by the CIS Evaluator will be included in the strategic plan that we are currently drafting.

Next week, we have Mr Clive Keevil, the new Head of Secondary (who will be starting in April), visiting the school to provide input in the strategic plan that is now in its final stages of preparation. I'm very excited about a number of new initiatives that we are working on, and we look forward to publishing the new school strategic plan early next term.

Because she was generous enough to give the school early notice, we were able to conduct a very thorough search with interviews in London, as well as in the Asia/Pacific region, for a suitable replacement to take over as our Head of Primary School. We would like to take this opportunity to thank Ms Terry for her dedication and contribution to the School.

# MUSIC @ HIS

## THE ART OF THINKING WITH SOUNDS

With Music Appreciation Week approaching in March (from the 3rd—6th), we wanted to give the HIS community a glimpse of our talented Music Department. This spotlight will be unpacking the music curriculum taught at HIS, as well as the major music co-curricular activities that students can participate in.

At HIS, the curriculum that we have designed is based on the IPC, IMYC, IGCSE and A-Level syllabi. The sequence of topics chosen are modelled in a way that corresponds and supports the IPC/IMYC units.

### Primary School

HIS provides a fun and enriching environment for primary students to study music, offering a wide variety of programmes that range from learning to play musical instruments to utilising the latest music technology. We give them the opportunity to experience music from their own culture as well as exploring music from other places and times.

From Years 1 to 6, we find that students' interests vary with their age group. The Milepost 1 (Years 1-2) learners enjoy playing and singing to mostly percussion instruments, as well as learning about music composers from different countries.

In Milepost 2 (Years 3-4), students have a greater capacity to explore more techniques and rhythmic skills, taking a liking towards African music culture. They learn to play musical instruments: the xylophone and the recorder respectively. Our music programmes allow students with a developed interest in playing an instrument to take up individual music lessons with both internal and external instructors.

The Milepost 3 (Years 5-6) learners are challenged to sing with canon and harmony, additionally, with a guitar or a ukulele in hand.

Using GarageBand, they compose short instrumental compositions with chord progressions.

Despite varying interests, the music curriculum was formed with the belief that all learners can develop a genuine appreciation for music.

Primary students explore musical concepts as performers, composers, and listeners. They will develop the knowledge, skills, and attitudes required to make the best of their musical ability.

## Secondary School

In Year 7, topics covered focus more on the performance component. Students listen to and understand the characteristics of music from different genres and cultures. We also teach the basics of various instruments such as guitar, keyboard, ukulele and drums. The students are currently learning about Samba Batucada percussion music from the Brazilian music tradition. Topics such as the common instrumentation and different rhythmic patterns from this type of music will be covered.

In Year 8, our focus is more on the composition component. Students learn about musical characteristics and composition techniques through understanding, listening and identifying the appearance of such techniques in different genres of music. Later on, students are required to compose a short phrase using GarageBand using the compositional techniques that they have learned. They are currently doing this by creating rhythmic patterns that reflect the characteristics of African music.

Year 9 students cover both the performance and composition components equally. Students learn to be innovative and creative in composing and performing in their preferred style. The students are currently learning about rap / hip-hop music and how to compose it using lyrics based on rhyme and slogan. They will also perform the composition using a list of given rap patterns, and are required to decide on the choice of instruments and tempo that they prefer for the musical accompaniment.

Year 11 and Year 13 students focus on listening skills, composing and performing based on the requirements of the IGCSE and A-Level examinations. The choice of repertoire that we analyse and the depth of analysis are based on the different requirements of the respective syllabi and examinations.

At the end of the academic year, students are expected to grow in confidence and creativity, and show in depth understanding of this subject matter through their performance, composition and academic discussion of music.

## Musical Co-Curricular Activities

Here at HIS, we provide a wide selection of CCAs, including numerous music CCAs of varying musical genres for students to experience and join. Listed below are the various music CCAs made available for our students.

### 24 Festive Drums

Founded in 2016, our 24 Festive Drums programme led by Ms Yong Wai Kuan has been a major success over the years. Although it struggled to recruit students at the beginning, more students are now showing their interest in this CCA, led by Hands Percussion. This was made possible by the founding students' enthusiasm and determination to showcase the culture and heritage of the 24 Festive Drums programme, as well as their amazing performances in several events thanks to Hands Percussion's Education and Outreach Team.


Ms Yong and her team of 28 talented drummers have performed in several major events including Open Days, Family Day, charity events, assemblies, music concerts and more, impressing both students and parents alike. To improve their drumming and performance skill levels, future plans for the 24 Festive Drums include attending a Drum Camp to interact with drummers from other schools, performing in more events outside of school and attending Outreach Programmes in Taiwan and China to better understand the cultural origins of the 24 Festive Drums.

### Chinese Orchestra

The Chinese Orchestra was founded by Mr Lee Boon Keat in 2015. The orchestra started off small, but over the years, it has grown into a massive group of talented musicians thanks to the efforts of Mr Lee in spreading the word and attracting students interested in Chinese culture and language. The Chinese Orchestra has performed in several major events, including assemblies, Open Days and musical concerts.

The team has had several collaborations with other schools to broaden the knowledge of the students, as well as to improve their own skill level. Mr Lee wishes to challenge all the students by slowly raising the difficulty level of their performances over time. This July, the Chinese Orchestra will be organising their very own concert, so be on the lookout! They also plan to visit Taiwan in December for a student exchange programme.

### Jazz/Contemporary Ensemble

The Jazz/Contemporary Ensemble is a new CCA founded by Mr Zailan Razak during the academic year 2019/2020. As it is relatively new, the Jazz Ensemble has not had any chances to perform at major events, but it will be performing during Music Appreciation Week and at HELP Music Festival hosted by Tunku Putra HIS in Kuching this March.

This is one of the first steps towards getting a “Big Bang” in HIS to expose the students to different music of Jazz origin like Latin Music, Big Band Music, Swing Music, Blues Music and even to the current R&B, Soul and Pop music. It is also planning on starting a Jazz Band/Big Band, Orchestra, Symphonic Band and also Marching Band in the near future. Mr Zailan is currently recruiting students who are interested and have had experiences playing Flute, Clarinet, Alto Saxophone, Trumpet, Trombone, Violin, Viola, Cello, Double Bass and Drums/ Percussion.



### HIS Sinfonetta

The HIS Sinfonetta is a musical group formed by Ms Chew Yi Tien in April 2019. It recruits students through a selective auditioning process, as well as constant observation of students who could potentially benefit from this CCA during music lessons. A small group of students from the HIS Sinfonetta participated in the Association of International Malaysian Schools (AIMS) Ensemble Competition in 2019, and will look to participate in more events organised by AIMS.

Ms Chew plans to expand the HIS Sinfonetta into the HIS Symphony Orchestra in the next 3 to 5 years by actively and continuously recruiting new members into the CCA.





## HIS Voicescapers

The HIS Voicescapers is a small choir group that was brought together by Ms Chew Yi Tien and Ms Yong this academic year. The choir consists of primary and secondary students from Year 3 all the way to A-Level. Ms Chew and Ms Yong, along with the help of Ms Claire and Ms Joanna, lead the students to perform all kinds of different songs, from Christmas carols to famous musical numbers. Currently, the HIS Voicescapers have performed in a few assemblies and will be performing during the Music Appreciation Week. We welcome any interested students to join the group.

The Music Department is looking at the long term progress and sustainability of the HIS Music Programme, and will be looking at ways to continue attracting the younger generation of students. They will also be exploring the possibility of engaging industrial practitioners and experts to conduct workshops and other activities for our students' benefit.

In the medium to long term, the Department is also exploring the possibility of our students participating in music camps and music festivals organised at the national and international levels.

Her latest documentary "Accept The Call" received a special mention for best documentary at the 2019 Woodstock Film Festival.

Ms Eunice has a master's in film directing from New York University's Tisch School of the Arts and a bachelor's in politics philosophy and economics from University of York. Her works have appeared on Discovery Channel, Al Jazeera English and Channel News Asia.

### SECTOR 1



## SECTOR 3



## EARTH HOUR

Earth Hour is a worldwide movement which is organised by the World Wide Fund for Nature (WWF). It is usually held towards the end of March, which coincides with the time of the Spring and Autumn equinoxes in the northern and southern hemispheres — this allows for a greater visual impact as the lights go out due to near simultaneous sunset times across the world.

This year, Earth Hour will be held on the March 28. Between 8:30pm to 9:30pm on this day, non-essential electric lights will be turned off for the entire hour across the globe. This event has been happening every year since 2007, supported by millions of individuals and thousands of businesses each year.

Earth Hour aims to unite people from different parts of the world together in an effort to tackle climate change. Turning off the lights for one hour once a year may seem relatively insignificant towards that. However, it provides an opportunity to create a united front to combat climate change by raising awareness and inspiring more people to take action beyond the hour, such as by supporting a local WWF project or getting involved in bigger Earth Hour campaigns in their respective countries.

Since it began, the Earth Hour movement has helped to:

-  Distribute thousands of wood-saving stoves to families in Madagascar
-  Install solar-powered lights in villages without electricity in India
-  Build public support to gain an extension of the temporary prohibition period of logging to reduce deforestation in Paraguay

and so much more!

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

# KANCIL SCIENCE COMPETITION

## 2019 AT A GLANCE

About 10,000 students participated in the Kancil Science Competition 2019. Among them, 103 winners from the Gamma category were invited to participate in the Malaysian Junior Science Olympiad (MyJSO). The MyJSO took place in July 2019 at the Kulliyah of ICT, International Islamic University Malaysia. It was a day-long contest that covers theoretical, practical and experimental aspects of science.

The six top scorers from MyJSO 2019 were invited to attend a series of training camps held in University Malaya, and to represent Malaysia in the International Junior Science Olympiad (IJSO). The IJSO was held in the beautiful city of Doha, Qatar in December 2019. A total of 403 students from 70 countries took part in IJSO. The Malaysian team did the country proud by winning 5 bronze and 1 silver medals. This extraordinary achievement of the national team was covered in The Star newspaper on 20 December 2019 under the heading "Teenagers make Malaysia proud".
