Reflection

Ms Celine MacArthur, Deputy Principal — Primary

As my first year at HIS draws to a close, it is time to reflect upon the exciting year of rigorous learning at HIS Primary. It has been truly wonderful getting to know all the children, parents and staff which make up the HIS community. The passion, enthusiasm and drive which one feels throughout the school make our school a special place to work.

We were fortunate to be able to work with Ms Liu Yueh Mei, our expert in the Singapore Mathematics curriculum from Singapore and have now strengthened our Singapore maths provision as well as establishing our Singapore maths coaches. Our commitment to excellence in mathematics was reflected in the success we achieved at the Singapore Maths Competition (SMaths), as well as the confidence we see in our children every day.

Regarding our IPC development, we have grown from strength to strength and this is evident when you ask our young learners to articulate their learning. In January, we welcomed Ms Helen O'Donoghue, an educational consultant from Fieldwork UK who spent 3 days reviewing our IPC programme. We were very proud when we received her positive reviews of our work and the children's learning. She was particularly pleased with the quality of our displays and how we used these to showcase our students' work, as well as deepen their knowledge and understanding.

As the entire school worked towards Apple Distinguished Status, the primary team fully embraced the advantages that technology can bring to the classroom. Our Apple iPad 1:1 programme brings the world into our classrooms, by not only engaging our young learners but enhancing and deepening their learning experience. As one walks around our corridors, you can see the children scanning QR codes to gather information, using apps such as 'Show Me' to write answers, 'Quizlet' to challenge each other, 'Seesaw' to capture and reflect upon their learning, bee bots to develop their coding skills and the green screens to produce news reports on international issues, to name but a few.

However, now that we have achieved Apple Distinguished School status, it is important to remember that we at HIS strive to keep a balance between the use of technology and other methods. We carefully plan the amount of 'screen time' and develop our students' social skills via the personal learning goals. Our students still spend a major part of their day talking, writing, drawing, running around and playing.

As I reflect further upon this year, it becomes apparent in every aspect of our school life, the development of the HIS masteries and our motto 'life in all its fullness'. So far, I have outlined the various avenues we use to develop the intellectual and career masteries, however, we as a

END-OF-YEAR PRIMARY SCHOOL PROJECT BASED LEARNING EXPERIENCE



How can we reduce inequality? The big question.

For three days in June, we collapsed the primary timetable and children were split into mixed groups within their own Milepost and asked to undertake a research project based around the UN Sustainability Goal Number 10: How to reduce inequality.

The aim of the project was to allow our children to deepen their international mindedness and understanding of the world, while investigating this 'big question' from many different perspectives and explore solutions.

For this project we followed the IPC Learning Process, commencing with the Entry Point.



Entry Point MP1 (Y1-2): Water and Food Shortage in Asia



Collecting, carrying and filtering dirty water followed by considering the difference between needs and wants.

MP3 (Y5-6): Inequality related to race and gender

Children were discriminated against based on the month they were born in. Children who were born January to June were handed sweets, got extra break time and the teachers gave them preferential treatment. July to December got the opposite.

MP2 (Y3-4): Inequality within Education in Asia



Undertaking difficult lessons with no differentiation or support, in silence. Not enough chairs or desks available, no lights turned on, no air con.



Knowledge Harvest

The children's prior knowledge was explored and teachers explaining the big idea of the project to the children prior to independent research

Knowledge

To know what inequality is and be aware of people who have fought for equality.

Understanding

To understand the reasons for discrimination and how it affects people's lives.

Skills

To research using a range of sources to answer key questions.

Research

Milepost 1 children gathered information from around school, from info points and using QR codes. Milepost 2 and 3 children discussed in groups and did their own research on their iPads about their given assignments.

Recording

All children were expected to display the knowledge they had learned, consider a solution and present to an audience what their findings were in order to deepen their understanding.


The Power of Reflection














Parents were invited to celebrate the childrens' learning at the Exit point, following a presentation on the importance on 'Talking about learning".

There have simply been too many successes to list them all here, but our trophy cabinet continues to expand with KLISS, MSSD and other sporting triumphs. Preschool to Year 1


It was a special day for our preschoolers as they got to spend the day in 'big school' as part of their transition experience to Year 1.

Meet Mr Paul, the newest member of our Senior Leadership Team, will join us in the new academic year as Assistant Principal for A-Levels and Secondary.

What made you consider (joining) HIS?

"Life in all its Fullness"- I love that tagline. However, that was not what hooked me to HIS. Looking beyond the glossy brochures, I visited HIS many times and spoke to the team of wonderful people behind the school and I was thrilled to find a team who were keen to live up to it.

The people, the enthusiasm and the heartbeat within this school resonated with me. I was excited and my spirit lifted when we talked about the possibilities of what 'life in its fullness' may offer. Before long, I started to refer to it as "our school" rather than "your school" and that was when I realised, this may be a place I should consider.

Could you tell us a little bit about your experience in other schools prior to HIS?

I have served in two international schools in Malaysia, functioning in various capacities. These two schools were very different from one another in many ways and it was thrilling to be part of each. However, my approach in both these schools has been "building character and moulding minds".

Beyond the subject content and its application, I worked hard create platforms to opportunities where students experience moments where their character would be and developed, stretched whilst actively challenging their minds to think laterally, critically and constructively. Among others, I took on roles in revamping programmes for co-curricular activities, the gifted and talented, improving academic performances and student leadership around this approach.

I was blessed to be a part of teams of very committed and competent educators whom I worked very closely with to make many of these

successes happen. And by successes, I would like to stress, it is always the people whom our lives have helped mould. Quoting Isaac Newton, "If I have seen further than others, it is upon standing on shoulders of giants."

Share with us your philosophy on education/ educating students.

As I mentioned earlier, "building character, moulding minds"- it is my philosophy in education. I seek to always develop the person. Each individual is born into this world with their potentials, gifts, talents and aptitudes. Education needs to prepare the student to be relevant in the community of tomorrow. Each student would have different potentials in different areas, each having varied capacities in different intelligences, all to achieve the purposes set before their lives.

I believe that a great character would make a great person. I aspire to inspire my students to stand with strong principles and values, yet respecting the perspectives of others and creating communities, through collaboration and communication.

I believe that students should not be taught to merely regurgitate content but to be equipped

with the skills to learn and re-learn, to think, to question and disagree, to desire to carve out possibilities in their journey.

I hope to continue this philosophy in HIS, hoping to integrate this philosophy into the collective mission to help students succeed in life and live a life of significance.

What are the three important goals you would like to set for HIS?

- 1. Developing self-leadership among students, starting with the A-Levels students, and then the secondary school students.
- Building upon the holistic education of students by developing more structure into the exploration of each student's talents and gifts.
- 3. Encouraging critical discussions and collaboration amongst students towards community development.

What made you take up teaching and education as your career choice?

I worked with young people for many years and noticed that many of them do not think critically and were frequently looking for people (or Google) to give them an answer. At a time when we are faced with unparalleled uncertainties and unexpected futures, these traits indicate that the future of our youth today is in dire straits.

In order to ensure a good future, a good education is needed. Education goes beyond a few years of book work. It must equip people with the tools to face the world that they will live in. I decided that instead of blaming the education system for not doing enough, I decided it is time to do something about it. My first classroom teaching experience happened when I was just 18 and I would like to remain in education till I am 88. There is so much to do and I urge more people to join me to be educators in any capacity that they could. After all, it takes a village to raise a child.

Based on your past experience, what strategies have you found to be most effective in helping students achieve their potentials?

In my experience, students are naturally keen to learn. Some may not seem like so (I would probably get some nods from parents of children in the secondary schools), but that desire exists somewhere in them, often hidden behind a sense of disappointment or self-doubt.

The first thing to establish is the current level of the student (or perceived level). Learning needs to be scaffolded, meaning it is to be developed in stages. Some learn faster, while others take more time - but everybody eventually learns.

But I would like to caution that each person is challenging their own potential and not the potential of their peer or the perceived potential from someone else. In short, the most effective strategy I have used with my students has been one that lets them realise that it is within their grasp to achieve.

Now, these 16 teams have done exceedingly well, and have the opportunity to compete in the Tournament of Champions to be held at Yale University, USA in November, 2017!

The 48 students from HIS have worked hard, submitting essays on a weekly basis, working on debates every Wednesday and reading up on all 6 subjects - Science and Technology, Literature, Arts and Music, History, Social Studies and Special Area (Urban Myth).
