

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Message from the Principal

A joy of learning in childhood will lead, exponentially, to a love of learning for life. I really believe that, as we strive to develop confident, independent learners, ready for an uncertain future in a difficult-to-predict world, we may well need to adapt our traditional educational methods to prepare for what is being termed the 4th Industrial Revolution.

At HIS, this past few weeks has seen a real focus on innovative ideas; hosting the AIMS (The Association of International Malaysian Schools) Teacher Conference brought about some excellent sharing of good practice but also a healthy discussion on change. As a Principal, I become ever more vocal on training, with our external educational stakeholders like Cambridge and the IPC. The conference provided an opportunity for some real development in this conversation and, in addition, Dr Gerard, our founding principal, has also asked us to host a group of trainee Australian teachers in January 2019. Mr Marson and I will be attending the Apple Distinguished Schools Global Innovation Summit in Chicago, in May, where we will be telling the HIS HIS will also be hosting the story. upcoming 'Innovation@School – Future Skills' meeting.

However, developing good local leaders and Malaysian trainers is key to making a difference in the international and private school systems as well as education in Malaysia in general. I hope that parents and the community at HIS can get behind that key message, in the same way they have with all of our forward-looking initiatives. We need our leaders for tomorrow, we need our teachers for tomorrow and we need to equip them with the skills to remain flexible and be ready for the future, because when we rise as educators, results rise too.

John Hattie, who has been at the forefront of educational research for 25 years, asserts that teachers make the biggest difference to the educational outcomes of students. A focus on teachers is absolutely right but it has also to be a focus on developing professionalism. It is about people, not structures and systems (which do, of course, have important parts to play). I am very proud of our staff but I am particularly proud to see some of the journeys our Malaysian colleagues have made as educators in their time at HIS.

Guy Claxton, who gave the keynote speech at the conference, talked about students' educational experience, using the terms 'performance mode' and 'learning mode'. Performance mode is an exam, a race, a performance. He talked about 'best performance' with high stakes vulnerable to mistakes and a culture where a fear of risk taking is an issue. Schools need to shift over more to 'learning mode' to encourage growth mindsets, to encourage experimentation, be open to feedback, be confident, be imaginative, to be collaborative and resilient. Training our teachers to make this shift to learning mode as a default teaching strategy is an achievable challenge but one that takes time and support to embed.

As the school is now in its fifth year of operation, I invite parents to join us on that journey, confident that we are being acknowledged for the things we do well. Our very short history has seen us awarded 5-Star SKIPS, an Apple Distinguished School, recognised as a Cambridge PDQ Teaching & Learning Centre, as Outstanding Cambridge Performers at IGCSE and A-Level, gained IPC Accreditation and more. I ask that you continue to come along with us. We are determined to be as innovative as other top schools in Malaysia and Singapore and that, with our sister schools in Johor and, in 2020, Kuching, we will be leading that change, ready for the future, now.

As we approach the end of Term 2, I would like to say best of luck to our students as they revise and prepare for their exams during the break. It has been another fantastic term. Our students' performances in MSSD, KLISS and World Scholar's Cup have been exceptional and we are very proud. 
















# Vp Close & Personal






ATM IS

In the early years of HIS, we focused our participation in two major competitions, KLISS (KL International School Sports) and MSSD (Mailis Sukan Sekolah Daerah). KLISS allowed our school to take part against eight other international schools in a variety of team sports, while MSSD gave our students chance to compete against both government and non-government schools in predominantly individual sports.

This academic year, we have strived to give our sports teams more fixtures than ever before by taking part in two additional leagues, KLSL (Kuala Lumpur Sports League) and ISAKL(International School Association of Kuala Lumpur). By the end of Term 2, it is estimated that HIS would have already taken part in 142 fixtures / competitions across 10 different sports in the current academic year so far!

In Terms 1 and 2, we have had fixtures across 10 different sports: Athletics, Badminton, Basketball, Benchball, Cross Country, Frisbee, Football, Netball, Swimming and Volleyball. As each sport is split into different age groups (such as Primary / Secondary, or U11 / U13 / U15 / O15), giving HIS a staggering 41 unique teams.

In this academic year, we have also expanded the number of teams on offer, adding Development teams for Boys Football at U9, U11, U13 and U15 level. This has given increased opportunities to students who may not have normally gotten the chance to represent HIS in sports.

This year, we have had a concerted effort to ensure that all teams train for at least two terms out of three wherever possible. The majority of teams will train in the term before their KLISS competition, and the term during their KLISS competition. This is to ensure that our teams are as prepared as possible when they go out to represent HIS. There are some sports and teams which train in all three terms (Football, Swimming, Netball, Frisbee, Rugby), however this is dependent on the availability of our sports facilities.

The majority of our students fall into the following age categories: U9 (Years 3 & 4), U11 (Y5 & 6), U13 (Y7 & 8), U15 (Y9 & 10), O15 (Y11+). There may be exceptions depending on the age and birth date of the student, which are checked by the teachers in charge of the teams.

There are more sports on offer than ever before at HIS across a wide assortment of different activities. It is my hope that one day HIS can reach a level where we are not only excelling in outside competitions, but that we can be a school where student participation in teams grows each year.

Lastly, having such a great deal of teams across a variety of different sports would not be possible if not for the hard work of teachers and external coaches. In 2017/18, 20 HIS staff across Primary and Secondary have given up their time to lead teams, and 7 external coaches have come into HIS to offer their expertise to our students. The medals and trophies we collect are a testament to the efforts of our students, teachers and coaches involved in Sports Teams at HIS.
